

# ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY






Chattogram Veterinary and Animal Sciences University (CVASU) formerly known as Chittagong Government Veterinary College (CGVC) started functioning on January, 1996 with 50 students in its first academic session under the Faculty of Science, University of Chittagong. Later on, the Chittagong Veterinary and Animal Sciences University (CVASU) was established by the Act of the Government of the People's Republic of Bangladesh on 07 August, 2006. Finally, Chittagong was changed to Chattogram by a government order in 2018 and the

University adopted the change in 2019 in its name. In the inception, the university offered 5-year Doctor of Veterinary Medicine (DVM) degree and gradually it has been expanding its offers in higher education on various other allied sciences to enhance research and development in the field of livestock, food technology and fisheries. Consequently, the university initiated 4-year bachelor degrees in Food Science and Technology and Fisheries in 2009 and 2013 respectively. In postgraduate programs, the university also offers Masters and Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) degrees under

different departments. Currently, the university has 3 faculties, 18 departments, 2 teaching veterinary hospitals, 3 institutes and 2 outreach campuses based in Hathazari and Cox's Bazar. Very recently the university has introduced 'CVASU Research Vessel' to be operated in Kaptai Lake to conduct need based researches on inland fisheries resources. A total of 1605 students are presently enrolled and 131 expert faculty members along with 216 supporting staffs are working together to run the academic activities of the university.



# THE FACULTY

At present there are 88 teachers in the Faculty of Veterinary Medicine in 9 departments. Doctor of Veterinary Medicine (DVM) is a 5-year technical degree including 1 year internship program. The faculty is led by a Dean who is appointed for 2 years on the basis of seniority of the professors of the Faculty. The Faculty offers various taught and

practical courses through the departments. Moreover, the Faculty is following an updated syllabus with the latest teaching methodologies e.g. Problem Based Learning (PBL). Over the years, the Faculty has been engaged in student exchange programs in reputed universities of the USA, Malaysia, Thailand and India.

# **ADMISSION**

CVASU is a coeducational institution and the admission to this university is highly competitive. The students after 12 class of schooling (Higher Secondary level) with Science background can appear in the admission test. Under the umbrella of cluster admission

test of the agricultural universities held at the beginning of the academic year, CVASU offers admission to 100 qualifying students for the Doctor of Veterinary Medicine (DVM) program. Importantly, the university maintains special provisions to provide admission

for the specific number of students from the country's indigenous community so as to encourage them in higher education and learning. A few seats are preserved for off springs of the freedom fighters as well.



# ANATOMY MUSEUM

The Anatomy Museum housed in a spacious well decorated room in the Department of Anatomy and Histology contains skeletons of different animals and birds such as horse, ox, deer, camel, duck, goat, sheep, pigeon, crocodile, snake, lizard, pig, ostrich and monkey. You may lose yourself in the country's first ever Anatomy Museum which displays 30 stuffed animals, 20 animal models, 500 specimens preserved in formaldehyde, 2,000 different types of bones, 75 models of different animals, 3,000 different slides and 30 portraits of scientists. Dried soft organs of some animals are also preserved in the museum. The University authorities have not fixed any entrance fee yet. Therefore, anyone can visit the museum free of cost on weekdays.







The SA Quadery Teaching Veterinary Hospital (SAQTVH) of CVASU offers hands-on exposure of clinical and surgical practices to the veterinary students in pursuing their undergraduate and postgraduate degrees. Everyday a good number of clinical and surgical cases of large and small animals are registered in this hospital for treatment and consultation purpose. The students from 3rd year of undergraduate DVM degree have

mandatory hospital duty up to their internship. The hospital also supports the DVM students from other Vet schools of home and abroad for their internship. Another new endeavor of CVASU-Teaching and Training Pet Hospital and Research Center (TTPHRC) situated at Purbachal. Dhaka is the first ever pet hospital of its kind in Bangladesh and is solely dedicated for pet animals.



Two new institutes and two new faculties will be established there to provide adequate research facilities to the students and researchers for knowledge development.



The undergraduate students could access the Computer lab during the library hours with its well set up 40 computers and necessary digital infrastructure to catch the ever increasing information. A well-equipped e-resource center is also there for accessing e-journals, e-books and others e-materials for research students. The computer lab is equipped with high-speed internet connections and a set of powerful multimedia capabilities.



XAMINATION AND

 Students of 1st, 3rd, 5th and 7th semester shall have to appear three-fourth of their respective semester examinations for promotion to the next semester, failing which he/she shall be declared to have failed in the respective semester examination and he/she shall have to get admission afresh with the students of the same semester of following session. Students of 9th semester of 5th year must get 11 credits for promotion to the next semester.

#### 2. From 1st year to 2nd year class

A student shall be promoted from 1<sup>st</sup> year to 2<sup>nd</sup> year class provided he/she earns at least 25 credits out of 30 credits of the 1<sup>st</sup> year class.

At this stage, he/she shall be allowed to earn the remaining credits of the 1st year class in the subsequent 1st and/or 2nd semester examination(s).

If he/she fails to earn the said remaining credits of the 1<sup>st</sup> year class within the subsequent 2<sup>nd</sup> year, he/ she shall not be promoted to the 5<sup>th</sup> semester of the 3<sup>rd</sup> year class. In that case, he/she shall be treated as student of the 4<sup>th</sup> semester of the 2<sup>nd</sup> year class and he/she must have to earn remaining credit(s) of the 1<sup>st</sup> year class within the subsequent semester examination of 2<sup>nd</sup> year class; failing which he/she shall be declared disqualified to continue the course.

If a student fails to earn at least 25 credits within the 1st year class (1st and 2nd semester), he/she shall be treated as a student of 1st year. The number(s) of credits earned by him/her below 25 will be treated as earned credits. He/she has to take part in the subsequent examinations (1st and/or 2nd semester) of the 1st year only for the lost credits, and added it with the previously earned credits. He/she has to earn at least the number of credit(s) out of the lost

credits to reach 25 to get promotion to the 2<sup>nd</sup> year class; failing which he/she shall be declared disqualified to continue the course, i.e. he/she shall be treated as no more student of the university. He/she must have to earn the remaining credit(s) of the 1<sup>st</sup> year class in the subsequent 1<sup>st</sup> and/or 2<sup>nd</sup> semester examination, failing which he/she shall be declared disqualified to continue the course.

#### 3. From 2<sup>nd</sup> year to 3<sup>rd</sup> year class

A student shall be promoted from 2<sup>nd</sup> year to 3<sup>rd</sup> year class provided he/she earns at least 35 credits out of 42 credits of the 2<sup>nd</sup> year class.

At this stage, he/she shall be allowed to earn the remaining credits of the 2<sup>nd</sup> year class in the subsequent 3<sup>rd</sup> and/or 4<sup>th</sup> semester examination(s).

If he/she fails to earn the said remaining credits of the 2<sup>nd</sup> year class within the subsequent 3<sup>rd</sup> year, he/ she shall not be promoted to the 7<sup>th</sup> semester of the 4<sup>th</sup> year class. In that case, he/she shall be treated as student of the 6<sup>th</sup> semester of the 3<sup>rd</sup> year class.

If a student fails to earn at least 35 credits within the 2<sup>nd</sup> year class (3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> semester), he/she shall be treated as a student of 2<sup>nd</sup> year class. The number(s) of credits earned by him/her below 35 will be treated as earned credits. He/she has to take part in the subsequent examination(s) (3<sup>rd</sup> and/or 4<sup>th</sup> semester) of the 2<sup>nd</sup> year only for the lost credits, and added it with the previously earned credits. He/she has to earn at least the number of credits out of the lost credit(s) to reach 35 to get promotion to the 3<sup>rd</sup> year class; failing which he/she shall be declared disqualified to continue the course, i.e. he/she shall be treated as no more student of the university.

He/she must have to earn the remaining credit(s) of the 2<sup>nd</sup> year class in the subsequent 3<sup>rd</sup> and/or 4<sup>th</sup> semester examination, failing which he/she shall be declared disqualified to continue the course.

#### 4. From 3rd year to 4th year class

A student shall be promoted from 3<sup>rd</sup> year to 4<sup>th</sup> year class provided he/she earns at least 37 credits out of 44 credits of the 3<sup>rd</sup> year class.

At this stage, he/she shall be allowed to earn the remaining credits of the 3<sup>rd</sup> year class in the subsequent 5<sup>th</sup> and/or 6<sup>th</sup> semester examination(s).

If he/she fails to earn the said remaining credits of the 3<sup>rd</sup> year class within the subsequent 4<sup>th</sup> year, he/she shall not be promoted to the 9<sup>th</sup> semester of the 5<sup>th</sup> year class. In that case, he/she shall be treated as student of the 8<sup>th</sup> semester of the 4<sup>th</sup> year class.

If a student fails to earn at least 37 credits within the 3rd year class (5th and 6th semester), he/she shall be treated as a student of 3rd year. The number(s) of credits earned by him/her below 37 will be treated as earned credits. He/she has to take part in the subsequent examination(s) (5<sup>th</sup> and/or 6<sup>th</sup> semester) of the 3<sup>rd</sup> year only for the lost credits, and added it with the previously earned credits. He/she has to earn at least the number of credit(s) out of the lost credits to reach 37 to get promotion to the 4th year class; failing which he/she shall be declared disqualified to continue the course, i.e. he/she shall be treated as no more student of the university. He/she must have to earn the remaining credit(s) of the 3rd year class in the subsequent 5th and/or 6th semester examination, failing which he/she shall be declared disqualified to continue the course.

#### 5. From 4th year to 5th year class

A student shall be promoted from 4<sup>th</sup> year to 5<sup>th</sup> year class provided he/she earns at least 37 credits out of 44 credits of the 4<sup>th</sup> year class.

At this stage, he/she shall be allowed to earn the remaining credits of the 4<sup>th</sup> year class in the subsequent 7<sup>th</sup> and/or 8<sup>th</sup> semester examination(s).

If he/she fails to earn the said remaining credits of the 4<sup>th</sup> year class within the subsequent 5<sup>th</sup> year, he/she shall be treated as student of the 10<sup>th</sup> semester of the 5<sup>th</sup> year class.

If a student fails to earn at least 37 credits within the 4<sup>th</sup> year class (7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> semester), he/she shall be treated as a student of 4<sup>th</sup> year. The number(s) of credits earned by him/her below 37 will be treated as earned credits. He/she has to take part in the

subsequent examination(s) (5<sup>th</sup> and/or 6<sup>th</sup> semester) of the 4<sup>th</sup> year only for the lost credits, and added it with the previously earned credits. He/she has to earn at least the number of credit(s) out of the lost credits to reach 37 to get promotion to the 4<sup>th</sup> year class; failing which he/she shall be declared disqualified to continue the course, i.e. he/she shall be treated as no more student of the university. He/she must have to earn the remaining credit(s) of the 4<sup>th</sup> year class in the subsequent 7<sup>th</sup> and/or 8<sup>th</sup> semester examination, failing which he/she shall be declared disqualified to continue the course.

#### 6. Awarding of degree after completion of 5th year

A student shall be declared passed in 5<sup>th</sup> year internship to complete the degree provided he/she earns all the 22 credits of the 5<sup>th</sup> year internship including the remaining credits of the 4<sup>th</sup> year (7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> semester).

If he/she fails to earn the remaining credits of the 4<sup>th</sup> year (7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> semester) class, he/ she have to earn the credits at the subsequent 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> semesters examinations, failing which he/she shall be provided one more chance to earn the remaining credits of the 4<sup>th</sup> year courses in the following 7<sup>th</sup> or 8<sup>th</sup> semester examination as irregular students. Students failing to clear the remaining credits of 4<sup>th</sup> year within the last chance will be treated as no more student of the university.

If a student earn at least 18 credits out of 22 credits of the 5<sup>th</sup> year class (9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> semester) he/she shall be allowed to appear for a subsequent examination of the 5<sup>th</sup> year for this lost credit. That subsequent examination shall have to be held with the respective examination. The results of examination will be published as soon as possible.

If a student fails to earn at least 18 of the 22 credits offered for the 9th and 10th semesters of 5th year, then he/she shall be treated as the student of the 5th year class. The number(s) of credits earned by him/her below 18 will be treated as earned credits. He/she has to take part in the subsequent examination(s) of 9th and/or 10th semester of the 5th year only for the lost credits and he/she must have to earn all the 22 credits of 5th year, failing which he/she shall not be awarded the DVM degree rather he/she shall be considered once again as a student of the 5th year. Those who fail to secure all 22 credits in the 3rd chance with supplementary examination if necessary will be considered as no more student of the university.

# INTERNSHIP

The objective of internship program is to provide practical exposures in the fields of veterinary, production and extension through different national and international placements. Total duration of the internship is one year. By this time, each student has to produce two scientific reports (clinical and production reports) with the aim of developing the following skills:

 Designing, organizing and conducting clinical and production based small studies

- 2. Presenting and writing scientific reports
- 3. Searching scientific literature and extracting necessary information
- 4. Using software for data analysis and referencing of the report

National and international collaborations have been established with different universities and organizations so that the students get opportunities to visit those to gain hands-on experiences.

#### MERCK SCHOLARSHIP AWARD

Veterinary students from around the world receive scholarships from Merck Animal Health in partnership with the American Veterinary Medical Foundation (AVMF). The students from second and third year are eligible to apply for the Merck scholarship. Successful applicants receive \$5000 scholarship to support their educational endeavors.

#### INTERNSHIP ALLOWANCE

During the internship period, the students receive an internship allowance of 15,000 BDT monthly to meet daily pocket money and the transport needs.






CVASU main campus is situated near-by Wireless Circle alongside the Zakir Hossain Road under Khulshi Police Station, at the center of the port city of Chattogram, Bangladesh. The Chattogram city can be reached from the capital Dhaka by train, bus and air. It takes approximately 6 hours by train or bus and about 45 minutes by air from Dhaka to Chattogram. The nearest inter-district bus stops are at A K Khan (2.6 km to west) and Dampara (2.7 km to east). If the inter-district bus enters the city and heads towards Dampara, you may get the drop at the main gate of the university. Otherwise, you need to get down at A K Khan from where you can come by local bus (# 4), tempo, rickshaw, taxi or you can take the help

of various ride sharing apps. If you come by train, your stoppage will be "Chattogram Railway Station" situated at New Market area which is about 6.2 km away from our campus. Again, you have the same before-mentioned transport options to come to the campus from the station.

You can also come by air to Chattogram from any major cities in the country. CVASU campus is around 22 km away from Shah Amanat International airport, Chattogram. There is no-convenient public transport directly from the airport to the campus though local buses are available outside the airport area. One have to use personal transport, taxi or ride sharing apps to reach the campus.
